# "Long Walk" WEDNESDAY 2ND AUGUST

#### Using the "first Wednesday" slot following the cancellation of Peter Moore's walk.

This is the walk I cancelled last year because of the forecast high temperatures. We will be walking through the Oxfordshire countryside south west of Banbury. The distance to the start point is about 35 miles (1hr journey time). Use **OX16 9UL** as a post code, this is for Saltway Farm shop. Drive past the farm shop entrance on your left and then look out for the small car park on your right about 0.25 mile further on just after the back of the Banbury town sign. The entrance is not signposted.

My satnav has taken me a couple of different ways. One way was via Daventry, pretty run but a bit twisty, the other picked up the Fosse Way at Brinklow to Princethorpe then A423 to Banbury. Fairly traffic free run.

The walking route is approximately 10 miles with 5 stiles all in the first half. Mostly good paths and a bit uppy downy. We will pass a castle, a watermill, through pretty villages and have some spectacular views at times. Coffee break will be near Broughton Castle where "Shakespeare In Love" was partly filmed. Then on for lunch at the Red Lion in Bloxham. <a href="https://www.the-red-lion-at-bloxham.co.uk/">https://www.the-red-lion-at-bloxham.co.uk/</a> which is about half way round. We had their fish and chips which were excellent. I did notice a sandwich order being delivered to a nearby table and that also looked very good.

We will have a short break on the banks of a reservoir about 2 miles before the end of the walk so save some coffee and a bun.

The Red Lion have indicated that they would like about 3 days notice of menu choices if we have a group of 10 or more to ensure that they can fulfill the order and meet all dietary needs. They also regularly change the menu so suggest that you make your choice in late July using the link above. Let me know your choice and I will send a group order.

The car park for the start of the walk is quite small and that combined with the travel distance, it makes sense to car share. I can offer two places. It would be helpful to me if you could express an interest at this stage and whether you can offer or would like a lift. We will meet at the Lutterworth Recreation Ground car park to sort out transport and leave at 8.45am. I expect to set off on our return home at around 4.00pm. Responses to george9high@hotmail.com. #### Ride out June 2023 - Lincolnshire

The days "were" getting longer, no rain forecast - ideal weather conditions for a ride into Lincolnshire.

Nine of our group joined the ride to The Fens. Whilst the "destination" was not that far we wanted to explore some quiet roads and enjoy the ride so travel time was always variable.

Our original plan was to visit two museums - in between enjoy a lunch - and home in time for tea!

We met on a Friday in Lutterworth at 09:30 hrs. Given the size of the group we elected to split "into two" if traffic conditions dictated. A rendezvous point on the A47 to the East of Uppingham had been agreed as the first stop if we got separated - which inevitably happened in Market Harborough.

We all got to the rendezvous point but it was an interesting scenario when the first group travelling East met the second group travelling West on the A47 outside Uppingham.

Duly reunited - a few miles on we stopped at Morcott Services for a comfort break. The services were being refurbished, other than fuel, but a former Little Chef now - A Taste of India (Rutland Point) - proved an excellent venue to have tea / coffee and a few bacon cobs. The staff were very welcoming and accommodating to a group of "mature" bikers on their doorstep.

Next target was our first museum. The route took us on the A47 around Peterborough and a simple left turn onto the B1167 to Throckenholt. Although the group did get separated at times in heavy traffic on the A47 it was with "precision" that all nine bikers (together) peeled off onto the B1167 which lead to the Museum located on the Old South Eau Bank, Throckenholt.

So - to the Museum of Technology (The History of Gadgets and Gizmos). This is a small - very modern - museum tucked away off the beaten track. To say it is full of excellently preserved and displayed items is a total understatement. I am sure anyone who visits will find something they can relate to and brings back a lost or deep memory. I did wonder however how many people actually owned some of the exhibits. As an example -an electrically operated tie press of the 1950's from Pifco!

# **Lively Discussion**

Meeting held on June 12th 2023

Our topic this month concerned the effects of so called green modifications to restrict traffic flow in many neighbourhoods around the country. These include low traffic neighbourhoods(LTNs) and ultra low emission zones (ULEZ) as well as complicated cycle and pedestrian routes at busy junctions. These schemes are mainly designed to reduce the use of fuel and therefore air pollution. Both of these benefits are very positive, but the changes have often been badly thought out and have upset residents who rely on their vehicles and businesses alike.

Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) is also frequently used to charge drivers for entering restricted areas if their vehicles exceed the permitted emissions. These attempts have not necessarily had the required effect, but has just moved the problems somewhere else.

There is also concern about the damage caused by heavy electric cars and longer lorries, particularly on rural roads and the potential safety of many bridges and multistorey car parks which were not designed to cope with the extra weight of these vehicles.

According to a recent review by the Institution of Structural Engineers, many of these require urgent and significant strengthening. Some councils are even considering banning electric cars from these car parks, rather than paying for expensive alterations.

Many authorities do not have the funding available to deal with normal maintenance costs for roads, especially if they have implemented costly traffic schemes.

Climate change and the continuing damage to the environment caused by the use of fossil fuels, not only in travel, but also in food production and other industries was also discussed. The richest 1% of the world's population cause more than twice the carbon pollution of the rest.

The idea that you can offset your individual pollution by planting trees is definitely sending the wrong message. It is the 1% of so called frequent flyers that account for 40% of the emission of carbon dioxide from air travel.

We were all concerned about the future and felt that joined up thinking, if it ever happened, could help to address what is an obvious and very serious problem.

Eighteen of us enjoyed a day out at Elton Hall, a romantic, part-Gothic historic house near Peterborough in Cambridgeshire, that has been in the Proby family for 400 years.

The weather was glorious. We had a lovely lunch at the adjacent Mulberry Cafe, based at Bosworth's Garden Centre in the walled garden.

After this, we were accompanied by our two guides as we walked to the hall for a private tour before the house opened to the public. Our guides gave us a very informative talk: the hall contains a wealth of paintings by Constable, Millais, Joshua Reynolds to name a few.



Every room contains treasures and there is a wonderful collection of porcelain and books. The library, one of the largest in private ownership, possesses such treasures as Henry VIII's prayer book. We were not able to see the original, but there were photocopied pages available showing the annotations by the king.

The gardens did not disappoint: awarded the Historic Houses Judges' Choice Garden of the Year in 2021, on display are topiary, glorious herbaceous borders with stunning blue delphiniums, a sunken lily pond and an orangery garden.

I would recommend this venue for a visit – it took us an hour each way in the minibus.

# **ENGINEERING, SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY**

## June event to Everards Brewery.

For our June event, Tony Allen arranged a visit to **Everards Brewery on the 90 acre site at Everards Meadows** Fosse Park for 10 ESTG members.

Our tour guide was the **Experiences Manager Claire Cannell** who has been with Everards for some 14yrs in various capacities and Claire's experience certainly gave the group vasts amount of technical detail each stage reached during our tour through the production process.

After the initial tour induction and video of the Everards family history in brewing, Claire ran through the current management structure which is **still family owned showing the succession line now in its 5 generation the hands Richard Everard Chairperson.** 

Thursday is a brewing day so we where able to see the process in action so to speak.

**Modern Breweries are an art form of Stainless Steel** piping, Valves and pumps connecting various Vessels in which the 'Wort' travels on its way to becoming beer, but first we sampled a selection of barley and hops which are used specifically to each particular beer recipe, quantities and condition of these ingredients remains a strict commercial secret.....

#### The Brewing Process seen by the group.

- 1. A cask Ale process starts with 30 min Milling of the barley after which it is added with hot water to the first infusion mash Tun for 2hrs.
- 2. This then transferred to the 2nd Tun (called a Lauter Tun) for grain separation and straining resulting in a clear liquid wort ready for pumping into the 3rd vessel.
- 3. The 3rd Kettel Tun subjects the wort to a whirlpool effect for around 2hr 40min finally clear any solids in wort.
- 4. The wort sugars are now at their peak and after cooling for 1hr in a separate vessel, Yeast is added to start the fermentation process in one of 3 vast containers, the liquid will remain fermenting for around 6 days in here where it will finally become an unfinished ale!

- 5. After fermentation it is 'Racked ' or settled for 1day in another container before being transferred to casks ready to be shipped to the Everards warehouse for one weeks conditioning.
- 6. Its journey by road to the Everard pubs for a further conditioning time of 4 days is the last piece of the process before finally being ready to be consumed and enjoyed by customers.

From start to finish the process takes around 3 weeks give or take a day but once "tapped " at the pub it's shelf life is 3-4 days so the landlord can't afford to hang around with it !!!!

Following the tour, Claire arranged for each member to taste 3 types of beer in 33cl sample glasses in the Beer Hall so we could all appreciate the different types brewed at Everards Meadows.

Totally separate to the tour, Tony Allen had booked a table in the Beer Hall restaurant where the group had lunch and a chance to finished off our tour "samples"......

I would like to thank Tony for all his effort in organising this great visit for the group and the group would like to thank Claire Cannell for making our tour both enjoyable and so informative. Chris Ridley













#### **PHOTOGRAPHY GROUP**

#### June 2023 report

Last month's guest speaker, Ian Swingler, set us the task of incorporating a composition technique known as "leading lines" in our monthly picture topic. "Leading lines" requires the photographer to find a "line" in the image that will take the viewers eye from, generally, the foreground of the picture to a subject or vanishing point in the background of the picture.

Although we have reviewed techniques of composition previously, and briefly mentioned leading lines it was some time ago and have not had this as a topic before. We therefore had a presentation of the topic looking at examples of the technique. We discovered that leading lines should provide a definitive "line" in the picture and can be a path, a road, a river or interestingly a line of vertical objects such as columns or lamp posts. We were encouraged to look for these "lines" in everyday life as practice for when we are out and about with our camera or phone looking for subjects to photograph.

We decided to look at our pictures after the presentation and each member was asked to assess if their pictures had met the criteria set out for "leading lines" as an aid in composition. We had many pictures, all good, but with varying degrees of success in the application of the technique. However, if you can find a line use it, if not and you like the view, take the picture anyway. Sometimes you will have found a line subconsciously and it will become apparent when you review the image.

Thanks to all who submitted their pictures, and we had some fun with gentle and positive review discussions.

This month's topic suggestion was "bugs", benign or otherwise insects in the garden. The gardeners in the group were horrified that we would find bugs in their garden, so the topic scope was broadened to become "Garden Wildlife". Typically, this can be insects such as beetles, butterflies, moths, bees, and even small birds, providing they are found in a domestic garden. If your garden is devoid of wildlife, be sociable, there must be many U3A colleagues who will welcome you to their garden, but don't forget the cakes.

We are continuing our meetings through the summer and our next meeting will be on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> July 2023, 10.00 am, in the Ullesthorpe Village Hall.


